

Success through technology for Whanganui Mum

There are many reasons people face the unknown and sign up for a *Computers in Homes* course. For some, it's about their children; to give them access to the world via the internet. Along the way, *Computers in Homes* parents find success as well.

Thelma Scanlon-Marino is a graduate of the *Computers in Homes* course run at Castlecliff School. She was one of the first people to do *Computers in Homes* in Whanganui about six years ago. Before Thelma started the course, she didn't have a computer at home nor did she have access to one. A computer and its uses were completely foreign to her. Her children – she is mother to 11, stepmother to six, grandmother to 28 and great grandmother to four – used computer technology at school. "My children are a wide range of ages – they were coming home from school saying 'we studied this and we did that, and Mum, you should be on Facebook'. Even my parents had a computer! I felt I was missing out."

Once she started *Computers in Homes* she got hooked. "Once I got the confidence to use a computer, I was able to move on to study business admin and computing at Training For You. During my studies, I was able to come to Castlecliff School for work experience and then I got a job here." Thelma is now the school office administrator at Castlecliff School.

She says "I am so grateful to *Computers in Homes*, every single day. That's why I say to our parents who come in, 'Have you registered for *Computers in Homes*?' It's amazing how many haven't and don't know about it!" When she first got her computer, she was so happy because her children had a research tool at home "and that computer has brought me to where I am today," she says.

Last year, in the national ITENZ Awards (Independent Tertiary Education New Zealand), a competition open to independent tertiary providers all over New Zealand, Thelma won the ITENZ Student of the Year award. She says her children were so proud of her.

Thelma continued her *Computers in Homes* story with us this year by supporting the parents at Castlecliff school to sign on to the programme, keeping them motivated and on track. She is a Whanganui champion for *Computer in Homes*.

Computers in Homes and PowerUp partnership in Christchurch

On 15 June 2015, twenty eight PowerUp families received computers as part of the 2020 Communication Trust's *Computers in Homes* programme.



"A computer is a very useful tool." Graduate Makereti Tiatia spoke on behalf of all PowerUp graduates.

The graduation was the first for a new partnership between Pasifika PowerUp (an education programme that actively supports Pasifika parents and families to champion their children's learning), Rowley Avenue School and *Computers in Homes*.

The families that graduated were identified by PowerUp or Rowley Ave School to participate because they had school-aged children but did not have a computer at home. They then completed a training session once a week for ten weeks. Having received the computer they then received 12 months of technical support and a subsidised internet connection. Families pay \$50 to participate in *Computers in Homes* and then contribute \$10 per week towards the cost of their internet connection.

One of the students, Makereti Tiatia said at her graduation "A computer is a very useful tool. Watch out children as we now know how to track you down! It's never too late to learn. I feel so grateful tonight. A computer is a tool to support each other, not just ourselves but our communities."

Senior teacher, Mamaitaloa Sagapolutele, said "CiH has given an opportunity for Pasifika parents to feel good about new learning, especially for their children. Together with PowerUp Christchurch, *Computers in Homes* gives us powerful tools for the future."

Wall of Fame Success Award

During the year we introduced a new initiative to recognise past programme participants who have achieved something special.

Our first inductee into our Wall of Fame was Karen Sadlier, who was one of the first *Computers in Homes* graduates in Gisborne in 2005. Karen studied part-time to become a teacher and since 2010 has been teaching at Sunrise Christian School in Gisborne.

Auckland

The Auckland Computers in Homes Project closed out the year with the graduation of 191 families in South Auckland schools.

It has been a year of excellent highs and challenges beginning with Mansell Senior School who were our media stars, attracting national television coverage and ending with our largest graduation to date for Auckland with 92 students in Pukekohe. There is something about every graduation that leaves an impression of how important the future of our tamariki is and the opportunities that have suddenly presented themselves to our graduates, their caregivers.

There has been a healthier uptake of Stepping UP as graduates begin to enjoy learning and can project how certain topics can help with employment or continued study. There is definitely more interest in continuing on to KiwiSkills ICDL.

One of the challenges has been getting our whānau connected to the internet by the time they graduate. With the introduction of a team member taking care of the sign-ups early – we have been seeing a higher connection rate and some very excited graduates that cannot wait to leave the graduation and take their computer home. We are waiting to see how our UFB students fare when it comes to connection time.

In the coming year we look forward to seeing an increase in students graduating and an expansion in delivery partners. We look forward to whittling our waiting lists down even more along with meeting new schools and their supporters.

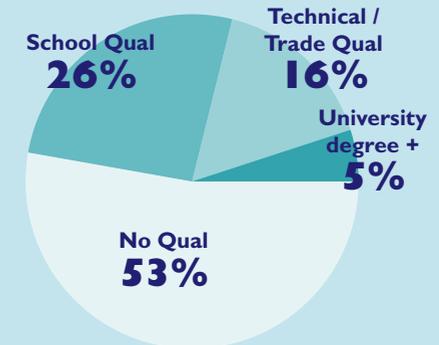

Computers in Homes training has taken place at 10 schools and community organisations in and around Christchurch during 2014-15, with 150 people participating.

Our main new collaboration in 2014-15 has been with PowerUp, an education programme that actively supports Pasifika parents and families to champion their children's learning. Twenty-eight families have graduated through this partnership, with more classes underway. As well as operating in schools in Christchurch, we have worked through 'wrap-around' community organisations such as Te Puna Oranga and Pura Pura Whetu, in order to reach families we might have otherwise missed for numerous health, social and other reasons.

Our Christchurch *Computers in Homes* team has had many changes recently. We sadly said good-bye to our long term trainer, Karen Sheppard when she moved further south. Joe Davidson is also no longer available as a trainer, as he has fulltime employment with SNAP (now 2 Degrees) – the Internet Service Provider to many of our CiH families. Joe is still available for technical support, as is Chris Danrell, who has been with us for four years now. We now have six new trainers; Susana Muamua, Brenda Taulilili Pau, Deanna O'Byrne, Vailia Afoa, Ria Jeffcoat and Sheena Hiley. All of these new trainers are recent graduates of the *Computers in Homes* programme, who excelled in their classes, and were willing to take on a new challenge in life. Ka pai!

The other new major change has been the appointment in April 2015 of Sylvia Smyth as our programme coordinator in Christchurch, as Sue Davidson was temporarily seconded to Auckland to investigate ways in which the 2020 Trust's digital literacy programmes (including *Computers in Homes*) can be scaled up to meet the huge demand in Auckland, especially South Auckland. Sylvia has had experience in public health/aid and community development in New Zealand and Asia, so is a wonderful asset to the programme.

DORA, our digital bus/classroom, has continued to be a fantastic resource for Christchurch, allowing us to reach out to schools, marae and other organisations that might not otherwise have been able to support digital literacy training. DORA is currently being showcased on the West Coast of the South Island, allowing others to understand how this mobile unit can support rural and disconnected areas.

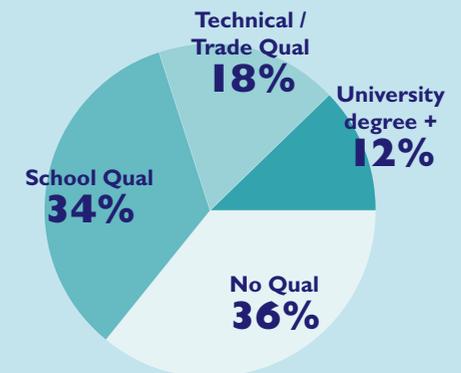

Dunedin/Otago

Dunedin, Central Otago and Clutha areas

The 2014–15 year has proved to be a new start for some pilot programmes in Dunedin, along with some positive results from earlier pilots. We started the year with the launch of our BYOD (Bring Your Own Device) pilot in two schools.

We have three schools on the BYOD equity pilot programme, with another on the waiting list. I have listened to a lot of feedback from this and three main comments have stood out to me. Firstly, Principals were pleased with being able to have input into the type of device their schools used and therefore being able to offer a better quality machine without stretching parents' financial resources. The second was from teachers. They were pleased that all students in the class had the same device and were all using the same Apps for classes, making it easier for them to plan lessons and making the running of the class more seamless. However the final feedback has come from the families themselves who were so happy to see their children engaged in learning while at home.

Our next pilot was giving parents the option of selecting either a laptop or desktop computer at graduation. Our first group of families to start training kept increasing rapidly once the word got around that laptops were an option. When it came to making their selection during week 3 of training, even when the need to participate in a two-monthly survey was explained, they remained undaunted. 90% selected the laptop option. I am looking forward to monitoring their feedback over the next 12 months although nothing works better than the bush telegraph! I have had a steady stream of enquiries about classes for next term. I am now holding a waiting list of families from throughout Dunedin who would be happy to travel anywhere in the city to participate in the programme if laptops remain an option. Maybe this is a sign of the times.

Our third pilot hinged around the fact that Dunedin was fortunate enough to win the Chorus competition for Gigatown. With Chorus working frantically to get the infrastructure in place Gigatown became available to all Dunedin customers in April 2015. Thanks to SNAP making it an affordable option for our families, we were able to connect 18 families from our last graduation to this service for the small cost of \$10 per week for the first 12 months. As an added bonus, SNAP offered the first 25 *Computers in Homes* families with "giga" connections uncapped data plans at the same price as their 50GB plan.

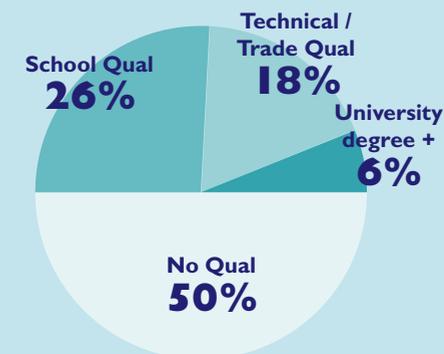

Opotiki, Kawerau and Whakatane

The first Computer in Homes Programme graduation this year was held at James Street School in Whakatane. Whānau were very pleased to receive their computers & certificates. The Principal (Nora) expressed her gratitude in having the CiH programme at her school.

During the year we have offered a wide range of Stepping UP classes as well as Computers in Homes. We have classes for new computer users (our beginners class) as well as more advanced classes for people looking to develop their Microsoft Office skills.

The Beginners' class has successfully completed 15 skillsets this term from personalising screen savers to Google internet.

The more advanced Stepping UP classes have attracted learners who come specifically to upskill in the Microsoft Office suite of programmes. Over half of the participants want to continue their studies to achieve the ICDL qualification.

There was a 100% attendance rate in both the Beginners & Stepping UP classes in Kawerau and Whakatane.

During the year, Eastbay Reap became an ICDL Accredited Test Centre. This means we can not only support our learners during training but also give them the opportunity to sit the ICDL exams and gain an internationally-recognised digital skills certificate.

We have welcomed jobseekers referred by Work and Income to the ICDL programme. Most learners are initially interested in creating an email account and setting up a Real Me identity so that they can access government services. However, as learners' confidence levels have increased, they have demonstrated a real commitment to learn more. Initially, many are well outside their comfort zone, but with the encouragement of their tutors and families they have persevered and most importantly learned to ask for help when needed.

Brett participated in *Computers in Homes* at Heartlands in Kawerau. On his last day he presented a PowerPoint presentation to the class. His passion topic was "Living with DB/Diabetes".

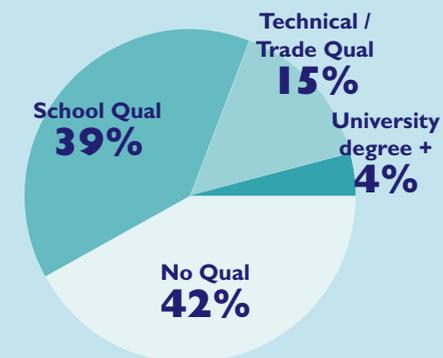

Far North

What a busy year we have had up here in the Far North. We started our 2014-15 year with Oturu School and graduated 13 families and then Broadwood School with 9 families. We then created a Community Training Centre at the new council building in Kaitaia, the Te Ahu Centre.

Te Ahu was already equipped with a computer training suite which we currently also use for Stepping UP. It worked out more cost effective than purchasing our own PCs and hiring other premises and we can reach those families who have missed out at recently visited schools or who have not yet had *Computers in Homes* at their school. It is a wonderful place for our families to train with great equipment including a smart board which our tutors love to use with their classes. At the beginning of Term 1 we had a launch event for those families with special guest Marama Fox of the Māori Party. What a treat it was to hear her inspiring words. Through this training centre we had our largest ever graduation at the end of Term 1 with 29 families. And what an event that was with our usual special guest Mayor John Carter.

Another large group of 42 families graduated on 26 June 2015 at the same venue. Kelvin Davis, Labour Party and David Clendon, Green Party joined us for this event and it was wonderful to be able to show them the work we have been doing. With Term 3 looming ahead of us I have started putting together plans for Paihia School, Te Kura o Hato Maria, Te Kura Taumata o Pungaru and the Te Ahu Centre once again which will lead us into our 2015-16 year.

Our Umawera Satellite Project now has several families connected to the internet with fantastic download/upload speeds. We were able to hook in to Okaihau School's fibre connection and transmit the signal over three towers to our Umawera Computers in Homes families. We are hoping to expand over the harbour to the Kohukohu/Rawene area in the future.

Stepping UP is going amazingly well at the Te Ahu Centre with two classes running each week and is consistently full. Ana Vivian, our tutor, has created PowerPoint presentations for each of the lessons, which the learners really appreciate. Classes are also running at the Kerikeri Procter Library. These have proved so popular that we have decided to run a second class each week starting in July. We have a great new tutor, Vicki Penfold; we appreciate her great enthusiasm. We are looking forward to expanding to other libraries in the Far North.

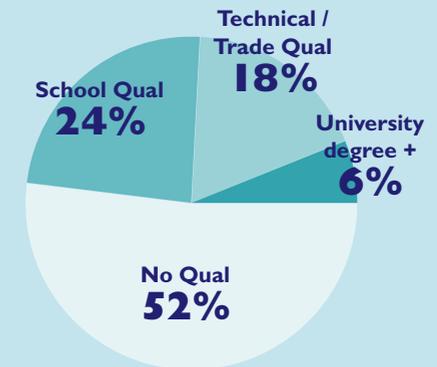

"This programme not only has it helped me with the basic general knowledge of using a computer that will help with my children's homework but it has helped me understand the importance of safe browsing, emailing and being able to stay connected with Family. We have also been informed of a computer course called Stepping UP that is free for those who wish to gain more knowledge of the computer at the Te Ahu Centre in Kaitaia at the Library and I may be able to check it out and see how it goes."

Gisborne/East Coast

Tairawhiti Technology Trust (TaiTech), has run six programmes this year with a wide variety of programme participants. TaiTech have partnered with the Te Hapara Whānau Aroha Centre and also Gisborne Community Corrections Department to run their programmes at TaiTech's CBD hub.

TaiTech has also delivered programmes through their rural community hubs at Whatatutu and Rangitukia.

Te Hapara Whānau Aroha Centre is an Anglican Church support group for young mothers who get assistance with various education programmes.

Gisborne Community Corrections Parole Officer, Paul Terekia approached CiH to trial some offenders serving a sentence of Community Work, to go through our programme. He was first introduced to CiH by a past school Principal when on holiday in Auckland. He was discussing how the majority of his clients would not have access to the internet.

Community Corrections carefully selected those clients who met the CiH criteria and who they thought would benefit the most.

Paul tells the story;

“Our department’s focus in 2015 is to reduce re-offending. With this in mind it was apparent that CiH principles align with our department’s goals and objectives to reduce the risk of re-offending. CiH has helped our offenders’ families use the internet, email and basic computer skills in their every day lives to enhance their school and work. Participants and their whanau have instant access to information through the internet and this puts them on a level playing field so to speak.”

As a further incentive to attend and complete the regular CiH training classes, offenders on community work sentence were eligible to have 20% of their community work hours deducted.

“All participants that completed the programme have been extremely thankful for the opportunity now they have their computer in their home”, said Paul.

Further programmes were run out of Te Kura o Hiruharama and also Te Kura o Manutuke. Both are rural kura with families who will benefit from Gisborne.Net’s ability to supply low cost rural WiFi.

Gisborne and East Coast interest has been high this year with many other schools lining up to be part of the 2015/16 programme.

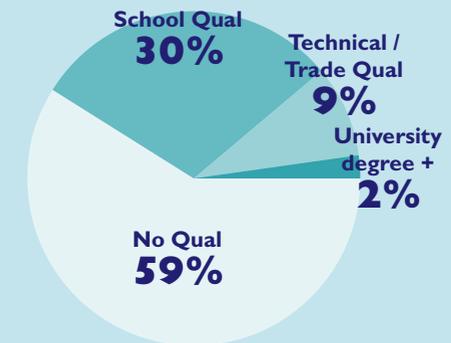

Communities supporting children's learning at school and at home is a highlight that *Computers in Homes* has made possible for many families of Maraenui and Whakatu communities during the year.

Computers in Homes training held in the middle of Maraenui at Te Ao Marama Kōhanga Reo was a huge benefit for 50 families. Many of those parents also had mokopuna at Te Ao Marama Kōhanga Reo which is known as the heart of Maraenui community. Before training had finished, over 200 people had walked through the door and asked for their names to be put on a waiting list for the next programme.

Te Kura o Mangateretere is in Whakatu community which is between Napier and Hastings. The community requested wider digital support for families whose children attended various surrounding schools. A computer training hub was set up at the Community Centre and championed by Des Ratima, a nominee for 2015 Pride of NZ Awards for community spirit, with the support of local Kōhanga Reo.

Henry Hill School's new direction is to create a modern learning environment with teachers and students applying total digital learning in the classroom. *Computers in Homes* has helped to ensure equitable learning opportunities, including supportive parents, for these students in their homes.

During the year, we created new relationships with Te Kura (Correspondence School) families, many in remote and isolated areas, and helped their students engage with new Te Kura online courses.

Thank you to the schools, families, community groups, community services and community champions for continuing to support *Computers in Homes* in Hawkes Bay.

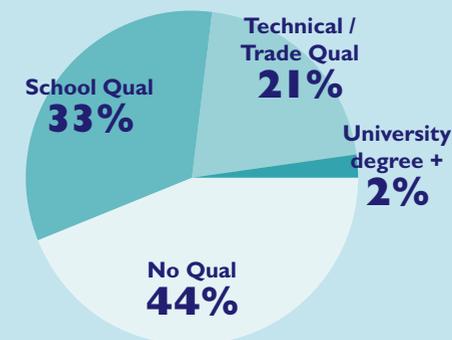

During 2014-15 we have focused our attention on the Otaki area. 31 of our 50 graduates were from four Kura: Te Kura o Whakatapuranga Rua Mano, Otaki College, Waitohu School and Otaki Primary School.

Many of the families that have participated in the programme have also been part of the chromebook initiative being managed by Te Reanga Ipurangi Trust based in Otaki. With the students being able to have access to the digital world at school the families involved in CiH now have greater access from their homes as well.

The last 15 spaces were allocated to Manukura in Palmerston North which is a satellite school for Te Kura o Te Rito in Otaki. It has been a pleasure working alongside these schools, staff and families throughout the process and I wish you all well on your journey in the digital world.

Stepping UP

Great news for the Horowhenua with Te Takere library offering the Stepping UP programme. Feedback from the library to date is that the programme is complementing existing digital literacy programmes and the community is making the most of what is available.

Now all the families in the Horowhenua have access to these free classes which also extend out to the satellite libraries in Foxton and Shannon.

Palmerston North Library continues to run Stepping UP for the Manawatu.

KiwiSkills – Job Seekers

A highlight for 2015 was the Sort it Youth Expo held in Palmerston North.

This was a fantastic venue for the KiwiSkills team to showcase the Digital Challenge and engage with local high schools and training providers in Palmerston North to promote the International Computer Driving Licence (ICDL) as a 'work-ready' skill.

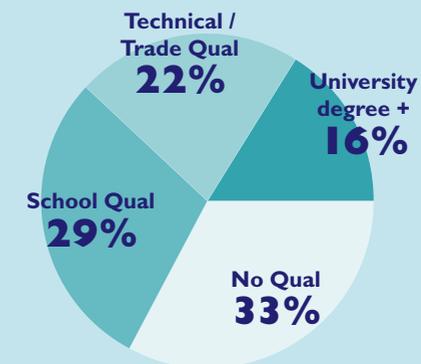

Nelson/Marlborough

Nelson, Marlborough and Tasman areas

Our year started with three training sessions being offered at Stoke School in Nelson. Due to the enthusiasm and energy of Principal Pete Mitchener, Stoke School families responded quickly and the places were soon filled. For those few extra spaces, families from neighbouring schools were welcomed aboard. After 10 weeks of training, 27 families successfully completed the programme and attended their graduation.

As a new *Computers in Homes* region last year, many schools were unaware of our existence. Now, as this situation changes, we are able to make a wider impact within the community.

In the Marlborough region Lapu Oliver, Pasifika Advocate, alerted us to a huge need for training in the area for Pasifika families. After some canvassing Redwoodtown School principal, Gary Hildyard offered to host training for these families, who came from 7 different schools. They decided to trial teachers as tutors, and while this created a heavy work load for the teachers, it also had the benefit of reducing barriers, shown by the confidence and improved relationships for parents with the school and a greater sense of belonging. The newly gained connections and relationships within the school were evident at a very colourful and fun graduation.

A highlight for me during the year was the introduction of Stepping UP training modules in libraries and the willingness of libraries to collaborate in this way. After a successful pilot and high demand, Marlborough District Libraries decided to continue using their tutor librarians and have continued to offer training as a part of their normal service to the public in the "business as usual" model. They have also extended out to Picton Library and Service Centre. Both Nelson Public Libraries and Tasman District Library were also open to this collaboration and have piloted training this year – again extending the opportunity out to their smaller libraries, and at present we have six libraries involved. Keeping material up to date is quite a mission with internet sites changing on a regular basis, so having a newly dedicated person on our team, Sue Kini, doing this is a great support to everyone involved.

Recently families from both Parklands School, Motueka and Auckland Point School, Nelson have been receiving the Warrant of Fitness check on their computers as they transition from their 12 months with the *Computers in Homes* programme. It is during this time that you hear some lovely stories about how the computers have been used and have benefited families. It is still evident that internet cost is a barrier and some families have been unable to maintain their internet connections.

We have yet to find a partner in the Nelson / Marlborough region to support the KiwiSkills Jobseekers opportunity. It is certainly an opportunity that I wouldn't want families from this region to miss. It is something to keep working on.

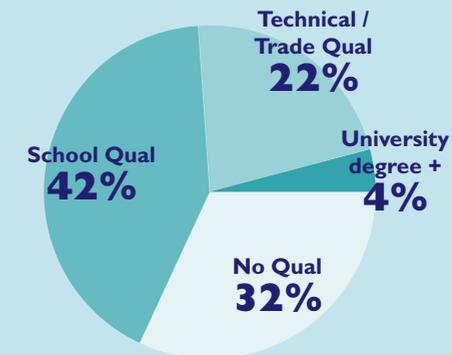

The Computers in Homes ethos is simple – bringing computer technology within reach of all New Zealand families with school aged children; helping parent-school relationships and building digital literacy and intergenerational learning.

So it's with this philosophy that I have been able to build relationships with 25 Northland schools over the past six years, and support digital literacy and connection for over 600 Tai Tokerau families.

The initial process of training families within low decile schools is certainly the first step; seeing them graduate and take their computers home with an internet connection is extremely gratifying. But how has their new skills and resources affected their lives? Here is some feedback from a survey we conduct one year later:

"I found it a huge benefit having the computer at home for myself and my children so they could go online and research things that I didn't know much about which was awesome for me knowing that they could get the answers they needed from the internet" says a family from Kawakawa.

A family from Moerewa commented *"I am more confident to work on a computer now, having not ever touched a computer to becoming confident is a big thing for me. Learning and watching my children use the computer is very beneficial as I know this is what's going to help them in the future."*

And another family concluded *"I believe having a computer at home is a huge benefit to any whānau especially with the information you can gather and share with your whānau - it has been great and one of the best things I have done for my whānau - doing the CIH program as I would never have just gone and bought a computer."*

This feedback speaks for itself – our ethos is being achieved.

One of my aims this year is to focus on classroom online activities. What websites or platforms are our primary, intermediate and secondary school children using in NZ? Whilst basic computing training like file management, emailing and internet skills are crucial elements of CIH training, how can we better collaborate with schools to ensure CIH parents are savvy in online programmes like Mathletics, Reading Eggs and Study Ladder which are currently being used in the primary sector?

As for parents with children in secondary schools, the NZ government is committed to having 85% of 18 year-olds achieving the National Certificate of Educational Achievement (NCEA) at Level 2 or an equivalent qualification in 2017. DIA is also leading the Government's goal of 70% of all New Zealanders completing common transactions with Government in a digital environment by 2017 (Better Public Services – Result 10).

How is this to be achieved and what framework needs to be in place? With 62,000 NZ households with school-aged children still without connectivity, the *Computers in Homes* programme is a proven model that, with continued funding, will definitely aide these goals of Government.

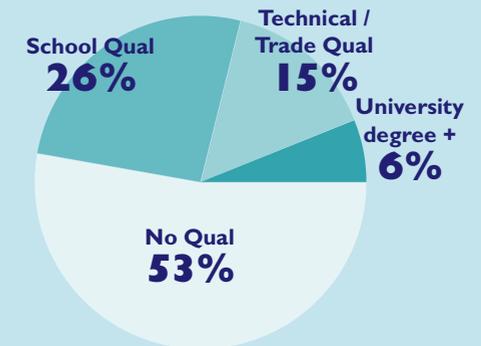

The Trust aims to help bridge the digital divide (this aim is a catch cry and part of our logo) by training families in computer skills to give them the confidence and tools to gain a job and therefore reduce unemployment, while also improving student achievement levels in the City's low decile schools.

The 25 low decile schools in Porirua refer their families to Porirua *Computers in Homes* programme run at the Porirua RSA in Porirua East. At the RSA training centre there are 30 student computers available for the training programme. Every school term there is a flood of registrations and sometimes we have too many to 'fit' into one class so we organise to have two classes per week. This pattern is now well established and we run two classes per school term in terms 1, 2 and 3, and one class in term 4, each year.

Highlights for the Trust

One of the key inspirations and motivations for those involved with *Computers in Homes* is the positive feedback we receive about the difference the programme has made to a family. Many times this change is transformational.

It is unlikely that anyone could remain aloof from such inspiring stories. It is especially good when you hear back from the graduate or their family directly and even more when they can express themselves clearly. Such was the case earlier this year when a graduate from our July 2014 course emailed me the following (completely unsolicited).

Hi Tim and colleagues.

I thought I would just update you on what has happened since I completed your course.

I have a job!!! I have worked four months in Mental Health and Addiction Support. The job of my dreams!! I didn't think I would ever get a job like this!

I applied online, did four assessment tests online and now in my workplace my computer learning has been a necessity for the amount of documenting we undertake.

Kasadi is going forward with her reading skills and can now read books to a level we thought would not happen at all! This has been helped enormously by her being able to access online learning.

I cannot express how grateful I am for the opportunity that Computers In Homes and all the people involved gave to myself and little Kasadi.

Keep it up!!! You are an awesome bunch!!

We have again received extra funding for 2015-16 from Lottery Community Grants to run Stepping UP. We are hoping we will provide even more support the local BYOD programme with whānau support for chromebooks as a Stepping UP programme. We are continuing to run Stepping UP after-hours on a Wednesday 6 pm – 8.30 pm as well as the usual Thursday morning slot 9.30 am – 12.00 pm.

We now have a contract with the Wellington Regional Work and Income office to run a work-focused course for Colombian refugees in the Wellington region (Wellington, Upper and Lower Hutt, and Porirua). The second of these courses will graduate in mid-July 2015. It is likely that from 2016 onwards we will look at the needs of other ethnic refugee groups.

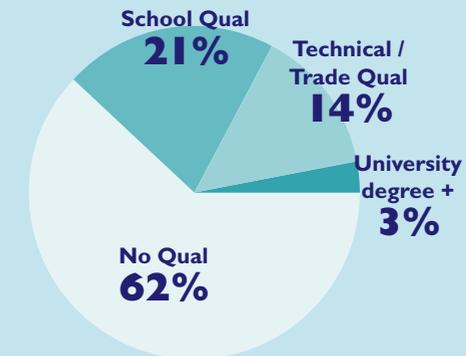

Rotorua/Tauranga

Rotorua/Tauranga has graduated 28 whānau this year with Brookfield Community centre leading the charge with two CiH programmes providing assistance to 23 whānau. The centre has a close relationship with Brookfield Primary School and is located right next door to the school.

They have also managed to assist 18 whānau with our Stepping UP programme.

Lucille from the Brookfield community who graduated earlier in the year has benefited enormously from *Computers in Homes*. Lucille has teenagers in the house who are now big consumers of the Internet with homework, social media and playing games.

"I had no previous experience with a personal computer. My teenagers required access to the Internet and it truly has opened my eyes to what's at your fingertips" said Lucille.

The Internet has helped her with paying bills online, searching for bargains and keeping in contact with whānau.

Lucille says *"Its given my family and I Independence, opportunities to job search, house hunting and going on trade me, plus numerous other stuff, it's been absolutely awesome. My girls have found homes with the house hunting and are now independent, all due to me having this computer and internet. I feel so much more confident in using computers now that i have taken part in the computers in homes programme. I recommend the computers in homes course to anyone of all ages and ethnics, and skill levels, it is easy to follow and we had an awesome tutor."*

Whānau numbers were down this year due to limited positions available within Rotorua and Tauranga. Also Nga Mataapuna Oranga regrettably had to pull out of our joint CiH partnership due to funding constraints. We do hope that they can come back on board in the future as our partnership was able to help 120 Whānau Ora families over the past two years.

However there has been a marked increase in enquiries from organisations who want to be a part of CiH. We have met with Iwi and Hapu groups and we hope to be able to assist them within the next two years. Interest has come from their hauora and education arms as they see *Computers in Homes* being a natural fit for their organisations outcomes.

Once again connecting rural Tauranga whānau to the internet has been a challenge as ADSL and Naked broadband is limited in some areas due to locality. Local wireless operators have been approached to

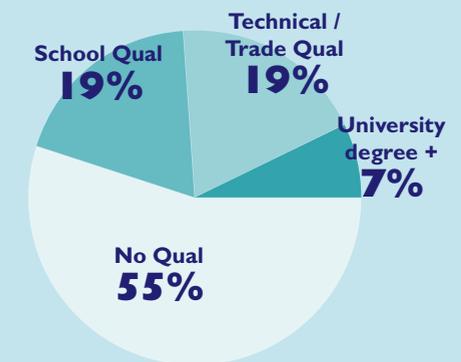

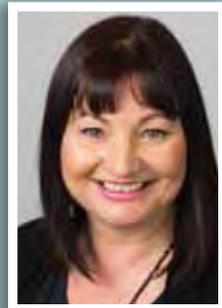

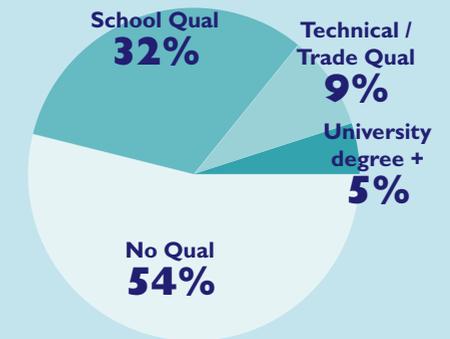

Thanks go to Chester Borrowes for agreeing to be an honorary trustee and to Christina for the huge amount of time and energy you put in to the delivery of *Computers In Homes*, for the Trust and the most importantly for the families who need it.

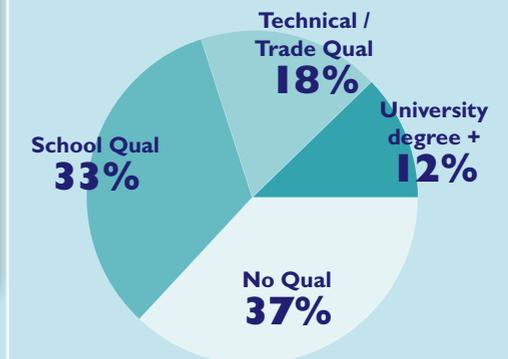

Waikato

Waikato, South Waikato, Hauraki, Otorohanga, Hamilton and Pīaḥo areas

During the 2014/15 year we were funded to support 100 families. With this resource we have graduated 106 students throughout the Waikato Region. We have worked with 7 different providers, four of which were schools and three were community hubs.

Computers in Homes Waikato is now operating as Web Access Waikato. We still deliver the *Computers in Homes* contract in the Waikato region.

During the year, the *Computers in Homes* programme was delivered to a high number of Hamilton based families, as the demand within the city has been very high. Relationships were maintained with the Meremere and Tokoroa Communities and a new relationship was formed with the Ngāruawahia Community House with the delivery of CIH programmes also occurring in these centres. We are in the process of forging new relationships outside the city for 2015-16 and are working on setting up programmes in Te Awamutu, Huntly West and Tokoroa Central.

This year we farewelled one of our most active and committed Tutors, Tracey Trainor. Tracey has worked diligently delivering the *Computers in Homes* and Stepping up Programmes in Tokoroa. She has recently been offered and accepted full time employment. While we are very sad to see her go, we are confident she will make an outstanding contribution in her new role.

The Warrant of Fitness's for computers have been held at Te Whare Kokonga, Te Whānau Putahi and Strathmore School. Further Warrant of Fitness's have been booked for Rhode Street School, Linkhouse and Te Aroha School. The WOF's have demonstrated that the hardware continues to perform well but those with internet access collect high numbers of viruses and the clean-up at the 12-18 month point makes a significant difference for those who elect to use this service.

Stepping UP continues throughout the region, particularly in Tokoroa where many *Computers in Homes* graduates have elected to continue their computer education. This has been well supported by the local school (Strathmore) who have allowed the free use of their facilities and the tireless commitment of their tutor. Stepping UP continues to afford us the ability to provide an opportunity to those who do not qualify for the *Computers in Homes* programme to engage in digital literacy education. This has been a popular programme and we continue to look for ways

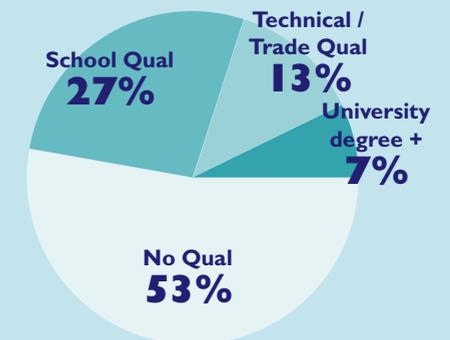

Wairarapa

South Wairarapa, Carterton, Masterton and Tararua areas

With this programme now funded through the Ministry of Education, we are ensuring that whilst the focus of the work is still on the parents, we need to maximise the opportunities to grow the connection between the home and the school.

As a proud partner in the Computer In Homes story, Wairarapa REAP makes sure that the families we are working with have the opportunity to meet with school staff during the process of training and graduation. We also then support the families in working closer with our REAP staff, through our adult programmes, and where appropriate involving our early childhood staff. Some of our work supporting schools to implement the Ka Hikitia Strategy also involves the parents from this programme.

We have continued with all of our original schools, and have added Featherston in this year, following approaches from their BOT and Principal. This has been a good move and ties in well with our continuing support for this community.

Changes to the internet arrangements have been welcomed, but we need to continue to be careful that the families can manage the extra costs before signing up.

We are still pursuing alternative WiFi possibilities and a small group is now actively looking at alternatives.

We also see that parents continue to be involved in learning through Stepping UP, and more recently through KiwiSkills.

We are in the process of gearing up for the delivery of KiwiSkills, purchasing 2 Batstations for our foyer and other tools to ensure we can provide a great service to these learners.

We continue to support digital learning experiences across many other programmes, especially in using smart phones, tablets and a wide variety of computers. Our experience is that many people are not embracing the move to a more technological age for a wide variety of reasons. We also see scope for supporting people to better utilise their smart digital devices and to provide a better understanding of the ways in which we can keep up with ongoing change.

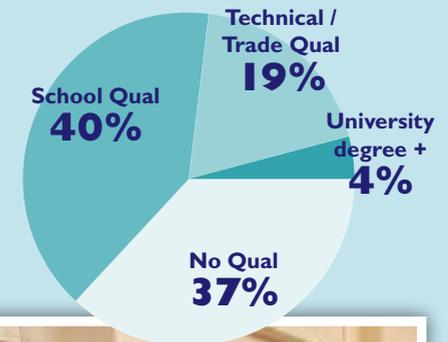

Wanganui

Wanganui, Marton and Raetihi areas

Computers in Homes Wanganui has had a great year with 130 whānau participating in our expanded region that now includes Ohakune, Taihape, Raetihi, Patea, Waverley and everything in between.

This year for the first time in our region we delivered to Raetihi Primary School with 17 whānau graduating in May 2015.

We have trialled Bring Your Own Devices (BYOD) at Tawhero School with 22 whānau. The trial has taught us a lot about the BYOD process and has been of significant benefit to those children who actively participate in bringing their devices to school as well as having internet access at home. We will continue to support these families through the 2015-16 year.

At the start of the 2014-15 year, management of Computers in Homes in Wanganui moved from the Wanganui District Council to the 2020 Trust. This has reduced management overhead for the Council and allowed the programme to be delivered more flexibly. The Council continues as a key stakeholder and has entered into an agreement with the 2020 Trust to offer the Stepping UP programme through the Wanganui public libraries. The change in delivery structure has also resulted in the formation of a new Steering Committee, ably chaired by Sharon Duff.

I believe that placing the programme firmly into the hands of the community has resulted in much stronger buy-in and participation at a committee and community level with more operational flexibility to deliver in a way that strengthens the engagement by schools and parents. This has been clearly demonstrated by the 130 whānau that have participated actively in our programme this year. We have more people on the waiting list and schools who have not participated in *Computers in Homes* for some time are now returning.

We have been well supported in our region by our local politicians (from central and local government) and our media. We continue to see our families succeed in ways that would not have been possible had it not been for technology.

We look forward to the 2015-16 year in both continuing with *Computers in Homes* as well as seeing our local libraries starting to deliver Stepping UP.

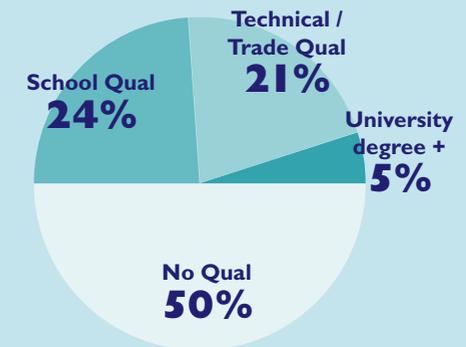

During the year, families at four Wellington Central Schools participated in Computers in Homes - Newtown, Holy Cross, Berhampore and St Anne's. With many people starting to think that desktop computers are a thing of the past, we were fortunate to be able to pilot a laptop option.

Once the schools were aware of the laptop/desktop option, family interest quickly grew beyond the allocated spaces. Of the 47 graduates, 80% chose a laptop.

Computers in Homes has many partners around the motu and all help to make the programme possible.

We had members from the RemarkIT team attend all the graduations. The amount of work Steve Livesley and his team did to refurbish the order of 47 laptops & desktops in a limited time frame was amazing. Also RemarkIT gifted 3 prizes for each school – Tablet, Digital Camera & Bluetooth Speaker. The lucky recipients were very thankful. Thank you Tim Findlay and your team for everything you do for the families of *Computers in Homes*.

Also, I would like to acknowledge Taita College. They have allowed Patrick Harlow to reuse parts from the school's obsolete machines to repair the families' computers when needed. Thank you for your continual support for the families and the *Computers in Homes* Programme.

During the year, we also saw a diverse group of cultures where language was a barrier for them. One school provided an interpreter to assist; in two others, participants helped each with language issues. In my last school we had three refugee families where their children helped, especially when it came to understanding about different internet connection types. Having diverse groups was a great experience as it made us more culturally aware.

Stepping Up

We had the first pilot session for Upper Hutt City Library in April 2015. The programme offered 13 classes with 8 computers. The programme was a great success where all sessions were full. We are now in the process of producing a report for the library so they can offer the programmes on an ongoing basis.

Hutt City Libraries are already operating in the 'business as usual' mode. Lillian Pak has taken over from Denise Clarkson, but has continued to promote the programme with energy and enthusiasm.

During the second term in 2015, there was a drop

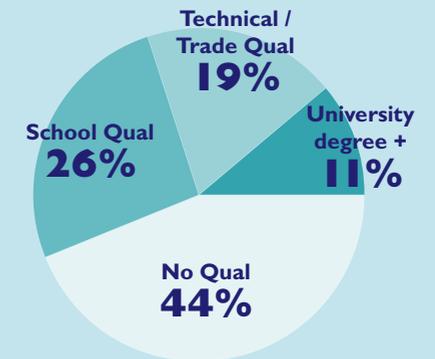

West Coast

Grey, Buller and Westland areas

During the year, we've learned a lot about how our West Coast engages with technology. A focus for WestREAP has been on collecting valuable information to help us target our education strategies to get the best coverage for our programmes and affect change. We know that technology, as both a communication and education resource in our community is thoroughly under-utilised. We have welcomed the opportunity to continue to address this challenge.

At the beginning of the 2014-15 year, we were ticking over. Regular busy classes in both Greymouth and Hokitika each term, plus an active satellite class made up of alumni from both groups using Skype every fortnight to support each other's projects and online activity. The satellite class became an excellent way for our learners to continue their learning in their groups and support each other with their tentative next steps into the Digital world. Sixty digital literacy learners, all of which progressed from *Computers in Homes* through Stepping UP and onto further digital programmes and courses – participated in West Coast *Computers in Homes* Digital Literacy programmes. We felt as though we were having a 'par for the course' type of year, the usual, nothing out of the ordinary, just good quality delivery of a great programme and a bunch of satisfied and happy students. For the first six months and then this happened in March 2015:

"We thought that since DORA won't be working in Christchurch for four months, rather than put her in storage, we might see if you want to have a turn with her and see what she can do for the Coast."

We didn't need to be asked twice! In true 'CiH 2020 Style' – we heard the news, created a plan, organised the logistics and picked her up within a fortnight, bringing DORA back to the West Coast on April 1 to keep her until July 31st. Well, that's the plan so far (see our special report about DORA's visit to the Coast).

Digital Steps

429 Digital Steps were completed during the year, the most popular being the Internet Security and Safety module, followed – and often combined with, Google and the Internet. We have a resurgence of parents and grandparents coming to dip into our Digital Steps modules as they support their young people with technology at home and at school.

BYOD Equity Pilot

We have also welcomed the opportunity to participate in the BYOD (Bring Your Own Device) equity pilot with Westland High School, supporting a total of 27 families. We have also created eight

customised training modules based on the Stepping UP format and including content relevant to the school, for teachers, for parents and for students. Students showing parents what they're doing and how it benefits their learning, parents learning how to keep their IT equipment and their family safe online at home and teachers coming up to speed with using technology as a teaching tool.

Stepping UP in Libraries

Two libraries on the West Coast (Westland and Greymouth District Libraries) are running Stepping UP.

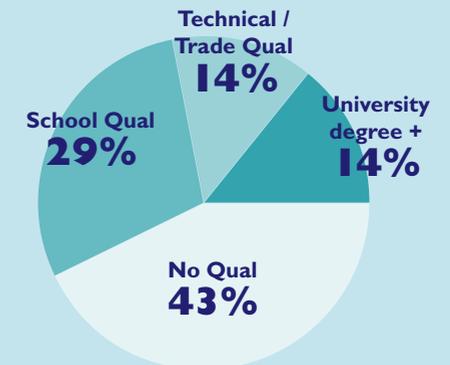
In Greymouth, our tutor ran 4 workshops for the Librarians – showing them how to deliver Stepping UP modules, how to step the learners through the surveys and gearing up the laptop pod. Four librarians now share the tutor work at their library. They run 3 sessions per week over two weeks every month including a morning, an afternoon and a Saturday. Most of the participants are older people who do not fit any other 'priority learner' criteria (33 Learners in Greymouth have participated so far).

In Hokitika, at the Westland District Library, our own tutor ran the class every Tuesday morning for one term. The Librarians sat in on the sessions and by the end of the term they were running classes themselves every Tuesday with four participants at a time. They have worked with 25 people over the last 6 months.
